Developing Children's Ministry Introductory Comments Dean G. Blevins

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There is no clearer mandate for the church than its responsibility to nurture and shape children. From the early Old Testament command to teach the love of God to children, to Jesus' own placing of a child in the center of the disciples as a model of the kingdom of God, children rely on the love of adults much like adults rely on the very grace of God. Children, as God's own creation, arrive in need of care, just like the Christ child. Children also bring gifts as they grow, whether it is their modeled vulnerability or their exuberant creativity. To imagine a world without children would be a place bereft of play, mischief, honest dismay, and loving dependence. The church's mandate to partner with parents and care for children provides a sober reminder that holiness of heart and life might best be measured by our love of God and child.

Providing sound leadership that both guides and empowers children remains a crucial task for local congregations. All too often, children's leadership must rely on entrepreneurial, independent ministry training, often inconsistent with Wesleyan-Holiness teaching and practice. This module attempts to provide a comprehensive approach for a theologically grounded and faithful ministry to children for the sake of the kingdom of God.

This module represents the diligent effort of a team of writers from academics in cooperation with the Children's Ministries division of Sunday School/Discipleship Ministries International (SDMI) at the Global Ministry Center of the Church of the Nazarene. The team has been at work for several years, often editing and re-editing previous editions, including this module. As with many multi-authored works, the project offers a diverse range of insights and methods that overlay each other with common themes and concerns.

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Finally, we offer a general reading list for the reader. All such lists become dated over time; however, these books are representative of the texts that informed the creation of these lessons.
